The Melanie Klein Trust define projective identification as " an unconscious phantasy in which aspects of the self or an internal object are split off and attributed to an external object ". So the idea is that we might project split off feelings routinely and that these are then introjected (absorbed) and identified with by the recipient (for positive or negative effect!).
